7 – Weeks 1-10	Heroes and Villains	Students will study a range of fiction and non-fiction texts looking at the theme of heroes and villains. This will include speeches and writing from real life heroes such as Anne Frank, Nelson Mandela, Martin Luther King, Malala Yousafzai. As well as this extracts from fiction texts such as Beowulf, Dracula and Frankenstein will be explored. Students will develop their ability to understand and interpret a range of texts. There will opportunities to develop writing which argues a viewpoint and creative writing with a chance for students to design their own hero.	Writing to argue a viewpoint – What is a hero? 7 – Weeks 11-20	Victorian Life	This unit of work will introduce students to texts that explore Victorian Life. Students will have the opportunity to learn about Victorian life through non- fiction texts focused on life of children and will look at some Blake poetry. The key text for this unit will be the play script version of Oliver Twist. This will be read and parts will be performed in class. 7 – Weeks 21-30	Dystopian and Science Fiction	This unit of work will use extracts from Science Fiction and dystopian fiction to inspire students to write their own dystopian story. Students will read the short story 'Examination Day' and extracts from Time Machine, Journey to the Centre of the Earth, 1984, Hunger Games and the Hobbit. The focus of the unit will be on narrative and descriptive writing with opportunities for students to redraft and improve work.
