Curriculum Aims

Life Skills is a curriculum that allows all age students to explore a range of topics that extend beyond the usual academic subjects in our primary, secondary, and recently developed special schools. Student's study and reflect on those areas of life which affect us all, developing knowledge, skills understanding, resilience and reflection. The core curriculum is based around the PSHE Association Thematic Model for key stage 1 to 4 and PSHE KS5 schemes of learning. The model covers all the statutory requirements for their phase, within a comprehensive PSHE education programme, fully meeting Department for Education's



statutory guidance on Relationships Education, RSE and Health Education.

We use the Gatsby 8 Pillars to inform our careers programme, using the software Unifrog as an integral part of our programme of study.

Religious studies is offered through two pathways, one of which is built in to Lifeskills, through skills led topics and further details can be found in the Meridian Trust Framework for PSHE, Careers and Values and the PRE-Curriculum map.

Key Curriculum Content

There are three overarching themes taught through age related content, meeting statutory standard for Relationship and Sex Education.

Key Stage 5
Curriculum Aims

The aim of Life Skills at Key Stage 5 is to build upon previous work and extend and apply knowledge to their current contexts.

This key stage represents our last opportunity to ensure that young people have real competence in the skills, language and strategies needed to extend the knowledge and understanding they have been developing throughout their education, ready for their futures.

A key element will be to support students to explore their options for University, Apprenticeships, or employment, using Unifrog to identify competencies and attributes.

How are students taught and assessed?

Assessment of Lifeskills is undertaken in a variety of ways, including student voice, staff delivering sessions, measuring progress of understanding, depth of knowledge.

Across the Trust, schools deliver the programme through a variety of methods. These could include:

- Timetabled lessons
- Tutor time activities
- Assemblies
- Drop-down days
- Visits (e.g. to a place of worship)

Wherever possible we draw upon outside speakers to share their expertise about the world of work, university or other areas of relevant

School will use a combination of teacher delivery and specialist visits from agencies and other providers.
For example Sharnbrook use iCash (sexual health) and Oynx (consent) and visits from the police (county lines).
NPA have used Road Safety Team (driver awareness) and Terence Higgins Trust (sexual health and consent).

Typical Curriculum Allocation:
1 lesson per week/2 drop down days per year

Beyond the classroom

Students are given a range of planned opportunities to enhance the curriculum offer. These include off site visits including places of worship, linked to the PRE-Curriculum and delivery; charity support and fundraising; outside speakers for a wide range of topic areas including careers, drugs, relationships, health, prison etc.

Cross-Trust Activities

Giving and Service opportunities are built across the trust as part of the PLEDGES programme and each school supports this through the delivery of Lifeskills.
